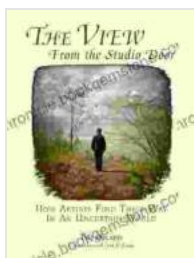

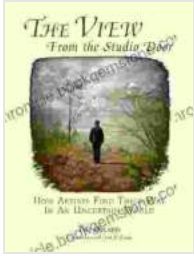
Tips for Finding Inspiration
